Fiscal Year 23: July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023*

Why

StoryArk envisions a world where all stories are welcomed, valued and uplifted as an integral part of the larger narrative. Since it became a nonprofit in 2016, StoryArk has helped youth in grades five through twelve initiate creative teams in which they communicate, collaborate and connect with each other to produce narrative podcasts, short films, and a literary magazine that publishes prose, poetry and visual arts.

StoryArk bridges the gap between assumption and authenticity. Through storytelling, real connections are made across different communities, schools, cultures and lived experiences. Students, teachers, administrators and members of the community learn what's important to each other, how they are different, and how they are the same.

Students are empowered to have agency over their own narrative, the way they view their life, and the way others understand them. Sharing through stories - whatever the medium - not only empowers the individual, but also creates a healthy community as people grow in empathy and understanding of student experiences. In this way, we fulfill our mission to empower youth voices and equip young artists to thrive.

Who



In the last twelve months, we have tripled the number of students served and doubled our full time staff.


1051 students served in FY23


- \sim 30% of students live in rural areas in South Central Minnesota; 70% of our students live in large towns/urban areas, most of them Twin Cities East Metro

What - StoryArk Programming

Students meet during the school day, after school, and at summer camps as planned, implemented and facilitated by our college aged StoryArk alumni whom we hire to be Emerging Professionals (EPs). StoryArk has built a career ladder opportunity by promoting more experienced EPs to become Program Directors (PDs) to head up our programs with the mentorship support of StoryArk's full time staff.



IN THE CLASSROOM

Culturally Responsive Student Leadership:

leadership training for 5th graders using stories to learn about self and others (420 - 5th graders in Forest Lake Area Schools - 22% BIPOC; 91 - 5th graders in Stillwater Area Public Schools - 30% BIPOC; 278 - 5th graders in St James, Madelia, Lake Crystal-Wellcome-Memorial, Maple River - 64% BIPOC)

My Story, Your Story, Our Story: Students consider their own roles, identities, culture, social styles and conflict styles and then apply what they learn to create original characters, determine themes, and develop a story as a class and within creative teams. (77 - 10th and 11th grade students - 65% BIPOC)

AFTER SCHOOL

Youth Executive Board:

high school leadership group that meets once a week after school and uses stories to advocate for self and for others (21 students - 90% BIPOC from Stillwater, Roseville, South St Paul, Inver Grove Heights and Forest Lake School Districts)

Boomsite Magazine:

an immersive, multimedia publication that features student stories across podcast, film and literary arts as well as print version Mini-Mags that include student prose, poetry and visual arts (120 students - 60% BIPOC)

SUMMER PROGRAMMING

July - August 2022:

Podcast, Film and Creative Writing Camps (48 students - 65% BIPOC)

Valley Friendship Club Photography Camp (12 neurodivergent young adults)

StoryArk Festival celebrating all student stories as shared through podcast, film, music, creative writing and visual arts

June 2023 Rising Action Tour:

High school youth from 4 different South Central Minnesota school districts joined together to collaborate, build relationships, create and share their stories through podcast, creative writing and music (44 students - 57% BIPOC)

Arts Administration Teams for South Central Minnesota and Twin Cities camps:

EPs and PD's plan, promote and implement camps held in July (14 students - 36% BIPOC)

Evaluation

Ripple Effect Mapping evaluation of StoryArk programming completed by the University of MN Extension Center noted StoryArk programming built impactful relationships, cultivated voice, pride, empowerment, created an accepting space for self-expression, taught life skills through experiences, unleashed creativity through a student initiated process, and taught students how to learn from each other.



Braided Funding Approach

StoryArk wants all students regardless of background, socio-economic status, political leanings, and religious views to have their stories uplifted, amplified and heard. To that end, we use a "braided" funding approach where each "strand" allows us to weave a strong fabric from which to support youth. This funding includes:

- 1) Grants including government grants (Minnesota State Arts Board, Regional Arts Councils, Nonprofit Infrastructure Program) and private grants (Hugh J Andersen Foundation, Fred C. and Kathryn B Andersen Foundation, St. Croix Valley Foundation, Kemp, ECMC and more)
- 2) School District Achievement and Integration dollars (Stillwater, Roseville, Inver Grove Heights, South St Paul, Forest Lake, Mankato, St James, Madelia, Lake Crystal-Welcome-Memorial, Maple River)
- 3) Individual contributions through fundraisers and direct donations

Each strand of our braided funding weaves a strong fabric to support all students. School districts, through integration and achievement dollars as well as transportation funds, can help us reach underrepresented youth whose stories are absent from the mainstream narrative. StoryArk, through donations and grants, can support students that do not meet the school district's criteria including homeschooling, out of district and more affluent, mainstream youth. Individual contributions help us meet specific student needs including technology and leadership opportunities otherwise not able to be afforded. By uplifting all student stories, we can interconnect diverse youth to each other and within the broader community.
